



\square 96% of the labour force (aged 15 to 64) is employed.
□ 15% of households have a monthly income of R3 200 or less.
□ 99% of households live in formal dwellings.
□ 99.6% of households have access to piped water in their dwelling or inside their yard.
$\ \square$ 99% of households have access to a flush toilet connected to the public sewer system.
$\ \square$ 99% of households have their refuse removed at least once a week.
□ 99.6% of households use electricity for lighting in their dwelling.


Rondebosch (East of Camp Ground Road, Glebe Road, Oakhurst Avenue, east of and including the YOB Sports Grounds and Keurboom Park) - Kenilworth (West of Kromboom Parkway, South of Doncaster Road, McKinley Road, Rosmead Avenue, Peffers Street, Third Avenue and Bell Road. East of Southern Railway line and North of Wetton Road) - Claremont (West of Kromboom Parkway and South of Alcoyne Road, Avenue De Mist, Belvedere Road and Keurboom Road. East of Palmyra Road, Stanhope Road and the Southern Suburbs Railway Line. North of Bell Road, Peffers Street, Mc kinley Road and Doncaster Roads.

Population size

Population Estimation: 28 624

In 2011 the population of Ward 058 was 28 624, an increase of 13% since 2001, and the number of households was 10 854, an increase of 6% since 2001. The average household size has increased from 2.48 to 2.64 in the 10 years.

SUBCOUNCIL 11 INPUTS TO LINE DEPARTMENT BUDGETS 2021/22

1. The Wetton Bridge

i) Vagrants often camp under here, lighting fires and blocking the pavement. The fires pose a risk to the structure of the bridge.

Solution:

Roads to put cement with jagged rocks to prevent habitation. Leave a narrow path for pedestrians closest to Thomas Road.

ii) Taxi drivers ignore the one way on the Wetton slip road, and drive up and down the road. The one way has to be enforced.

Solution:

Roads to put in more signage and yellow bollards.

2. Grassy area east of Kenilworth Station railway line, South of Kenilworth Road, above Blackheath Road

Vagrants occupy this area, lighting fires, breaking into Chesterton flats, indulging in prostitution and drug dealing, littering, defecating, urinating.

Solution:

- Ward 58 residents and ward committee budget to contribute to a fence to prevent access to this
 area. A gate with keys given to body corporates of Chesterton and Chamonix flats in Blackheath
 Road.
- Chesterton Body Corporate to rent the land from the City Council.
- Residents in Blackheath Road to maintain the area as a community garden.

3. Imam Haron/Stanley Road parking lot

Vagrants occupy this space, and there has been drug dealing, littering, defecation as well as suspected break-ins in Miller Road and Stanley Road.

Solution:

Harlyn Neighbourhood Watch to raise funds from the community in a designated bank account to put up a fence around the parking lot. Harlyn NHW and business owners adjacent to and opposite the parking lot to have keys to the gate, which will be opened in the mornings for public parking, and closed in the evenings. As this is City-owned land, no parking fees may be charged.

An agreement will be signed regarding opening and closing the parking lot so that the City knows who is responsible.

No participation is required, as no rights are affected.

The My Citi bus route will be along Imam Haron Road, so the fence has to align with the widened road.

4. Park Road/Campground Road intersection

Early morning rush hour traffic frustrates drivers as the left hand lane from Park Road into Campground Road is designated for both straight and left. Belmont Road fills up with traffic, preventing motorists from driving straight into Belmont Road. Motorists wanting to turn left to take children to schools along Campground and Palmyra get stuck in the left hand lane.

Short term solution:

Roads to mark

- the left hand lane as LEFT TURN ONLY
- The middle lane as STRAIGHT ONLY
- The right hand lane as RIGHT ONLY Road signs to be put up to inform drivers of the new lane markings.

Long term solution:

Roads to take out a section of the traffic island to add one lane to increase the number of lanes to four:

- Left only
- Left and Straight
- Straight only
- Right only
